About

Foodbank of Indonesia

Foodbank of Indonesia is a social organization dedicated to providing food assistance to Indonesian people who are hungry and vulnerable through strengthening the local community. Our work is focused on three core areas: food intervention, bringing families closer to food resources, education and capacity building.

Through Indonesia Hunger-Free Future is our dream and becomes our key message campaign movement to realize Indonesia 100% food equality, free from hunger through providing food access, alleviate malnutrition and hunger-especially for children and elder people.



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Foreword

2020-2021 was the most challenging period. In 2019, 25 million people or 9.4% of the total population is under the poverty line, meanwhile 55 million or 20.6%, live slightly above the poverty line. This group is vulnerable to falling below the poverty line in 2021-2022. The Covid-19 pandemic forced people to quarantine themselves and many families lost their wage earners. The income shock has disrupted the food security of households in the lowest income group and risks their children's development. Children are also at risk of unhealthy food consumption which may lead to undernourishment.

Women were proven as catalysts to avoid further social and economic catastrophe. Indonesia was hit by a series of natural disasters during 2019 and this was greatly compounded by waves of the Covid-19 pandemic. Women play an important role in opening direct food access to families via two kinds of activities: gathering and processing food, and supporting families' economics. Women's knowledge and skills play an important role in gathering and processing the food. Locally sourced food is the most suitable option available for the healthiest and cheapest options. Small scale enterprises are the backbone of Indonesia's economy, contributing about 61% of GDP and absorbing 97% of the total workforce. 64.5% of these small scale enterprises are run by women and the majority are in the food sector. This figure suggests once again to FOI that women empowerment is a crucial factor in enabling food access for Indonesian families.

In 2021 we started KEPAK (Kebun Pangan Komunitas - Community Food Garden) to encourage the community to grow their own food so that they have food security amid the difficult situation. KEPAK requires the community to work together in collecting organic waste as fertilizer, processing the food for children and elderly people, and saving the food surplus. KEPAK has been developed in both urban and rural areas. Limited land in urban areas is not an obstacle to produce good food for families and communities, as has been done in Kembangan and Kebayoran Lama, DKI Jakarta. Meanwhile, KEPAK in rural areas has promoted regenerative agriculture with local wisdom to produce good quality and healthy food as is currently underway in Kiarasari, Bogor.

On behalf of Foodbank of Indonesia, I would like to thank and extend my gratitude to each volunteer whose resilience and willingness to keep fighting to help those who are most in need amid the crisis has inspired us all. I also extend my gratitude to each donor and partner for their generosity that has allowed us to keep moving and giving food assistance for the needy. We will continue working together to bring relief to those who are struggling with hunger in the years to come. We are also committed to train, educate, and involve women through our programs, and to Promote Prosperity and Fight Hunger in Indonesia wherever possible.

Year in Review

2021

Foodbank of Indonesia collaborates with organizations right across the food and grocery sector to provide safe and quality surplus food and redistribute it to the right beneficiary. Besides that, FOI also collaborates with companies to provide funding assistance through a comprehensive granting program. Moreover, there are also individuals donating the excess food. This ensures funding and also food to help food banks enhance the way in providing services to beneficiaries and the community. In 2021, food donations received decreased from the previous year, this was affected by the pandemic which caused the slow down growth of the industrial sector. FOI provides food assistance as a response to emergencies for among those who are struggling, several groups have higher vulnerability consist of people with disabilities, children, elderly, and informal sector workers.

Women's Movement: The Catalyst Amid Crisis

Indonesia facing multiple crises in 2021. The beginning of the year opened with disasters in various regions which caused grief. Among them are earthquakes, floods, landslides, storms, mountain eruptions, forest fires, and droughts. Hundreds of people died, dozens of lives were lost and millions of people suffered and were displaced. It has destroyed buildings and other facilities. Various disasters that occurred were dominated by hydrometeorological disasters, the impact of climate change.

The increase in the earth's temperature triggers many changes in the atmosphere that have an impact on unpredictable weather and climate. Indonesia as an archipelagic country with a geographical and hydrological position located between two continents, two oceans, and also in the ring of fire, makes Indonesia more vulnerable to the impacts of climate change. Fluctuations in weather and climate change have an impact on high rainfall and tropical storms which are prone to hydrometeorological disasters such as floods, strong winds, and landslides. If this situation continues, the next generation will be hit by extreme weather and disasters that threaten food security much more often.

In addition, as the world's fourth most populous country, Indonesia may face massive covid-19 outbreaks. In 2021, the second full year of the COVID-19 pandemic remained the largest challenge for the Indonesian societies. Lower incomes, even more layoffs, which increase poverty rates. In the third quarter, some new variants were also found, such as Alpha, Beta, and Delta. Delta contributed the biggest numbers with faster virus transmissions and a higher risk to infect children and younger.

Globally, the impact of the pandemic was very devastating for many aspects of life, especially for those who live in poverty. The number of poor people in Indonesia in 2021 was 26.50 million, increased by 5.09% compared to the previous year reported by The Central Statistics Agency. Children and elderly people are those who impacted the most within the vulnerable people group. UNICEF warns of a lost generation as covid-19 threatens to cause irreversible harm to children's education, nutrition, and well-being. Poor nutrition in toddler and children harms their growth and development, affecting her ability to do well in school and earn a good living in the future.



Pandemic situations have resulted in a growing number of job losses and income reduction. Not all of them can easily adapt to these conditions, especially the lowest society. They must strive to ensure that today they and their families can fill their stomachs. Especially if they have to be quarantined and forced to lose their livelihood.

In these crisis conditions, amidst disaster and pandemic, evidently women are the catalyst in these conditions. They have an essential role, particularly in taking care of their family and provision of food needs. In fact, the layoffs of men from the company due to the pandemic, has made women carry out multiple roles in order to survive their families. She is not only responsible for household affairs, but also being the backbone of the family. They continue to struggle and rack their brains to find ways to meet their daily food needs, one of which is realized by opening a small business at home. In fact, during this pandemic, home entrepreneurs have emerged whose drivers are women.

Women as agents of change, considering their position as a decisive role. That's encouraged Foodbank of Indonesia social movements since 2015 to move together with women and empower them to transform communities for better. FOI working with various parties and mobilizing thousands of volunteers, mostly women, in several cities to overcome food insecurity and hunger problems that arise. Since 2020, FOI encourages women's movements, namely "Gerakan Seribu Ibu" (En. One Thousands Mother Movements) as a catalyst in a time of crises to alleviate the impacts of pandemic and disaster, poverty, and to ensure vulnerable communities survive. They struggle and sacrifice time, energy, and thoughts to help vulnerable society eliminate their hunger. Even though they are busy taking care of their families, they still help local vulnerable society to get food needs with all their kindhearted and hands. The role of women in the FOI movement proves that it is very needed in opening access to food, especially for children. The figure of mother and teacher is so important because they are so close to children's daily activity and have a direct influence on both education and food-related interventions.

In 2015 FOI began to move to help vulnerable communities, especially children, the elderly, and the poor through multi-stakeholder collaboration. Being a part of FOI since 2016 in opening access to food, especially in Jogja, brings such pride for me. Through its programs, FOI reaches out everyday and creates a smile for its beneficiaries, especially with the Gerakan Seribu Ibu.

The Mentari Bangsaku Program in Yogyakarta is entering its 5th year. The regular donation of food from FOI to educational institutions is very beneficial. The additional food given to PAUD makes the students more excited to go to school and become more focused on thinking so that one day they can become the sun of the nation for the country in the future.

FOI's actions in fighting hunger also cover poor families and natural disasters that occur one after another in 2021. With alacrity, FOI women volunteers do not tire of continuing to be an extension of donors to those in need. A packet of food, a packet of hope for the recipient.

DAPUR PANGAN

An Uplifting Community Pantry

The number of COVID-19 cases is increasing every day, exacerbated by the emergence of a new virus with faster transmission and higher risk.

Thousands of families are struggling to fulfill their needs. They must strive to ensure that today they and their families can fill their stomachs. Especially if they have to be quarantined and forced to lose their livelihood.

DAPUR PANGAN FOI (DPF), a community-based pantry located in the midst of the community, is mobilized by local women to cook and provide ready-to-eat food for underprivileged communities who are self-isolating, children, elderly, and people in need.

This pantry gives hope and uplifting their spirit in these difficult situations. Reduce the suffering of those who always think about what they can eat today?. One of the good stories of this program is that the movement has built a sense of community and social connection.

FOI collaborates with various parties, one of which is the Zipmex Exchange in strengthening and continuing to revive community pantries in the midst of an emergency situation. A total of 10 DPF spread across five areas of DKI Jakarta received various cooking utensils in the #ZipmexPeduli program to streamline the cooking process, also cook 2,900 portions of food for self-isolating underprivileged people who are in isolation.

Together with PT Sunlife Indonesia, through the DPF program, 16,000 portions of food have been processed and distributed to communities vulnerable to the COVID-19 outbreak in 9 regions in Indonesia, including DKI Jakarta, Medan, Padang, Palembang, Bandung, Solo, Surabaya, Denpasar, to Lombok.

RESPONSE ON EMERGENCY AND DISASTER

Giving Happiness In The Midst of Grief

In addition to the covid pandemic, throughout 2021 Indonesia was hit by a number of disasters in various regions that caused grief. Among them are earthquakes, floods, landslides, storms, mountain eruptions, forest fires, and droughts. Hundreds of people died, dozens of lives were lost and millions of people suffered and were displaced.

With extreme weather changes, rising temperatures, and natural disasters that occur, crop failure is inevitable, so that the amount of food production decreases and is limited, while the human population and food needs continue to increase.

When disaster strikes, through Responses on Emergencies and Disaster (RED) program, FOI works directly with donors to bring support to people suffering from disasters. FOI together with local leaders and volunteers providing food assistance and emergency supplies for affected communities and helping the community to recover from the disaster sooner.

With this support and assistance, it is hoped that it can heal the grief of the victims and give happiness and joy for them.

In early 2021, FOI helped people affected by the disasters that hit Sumedang, Jember, and Lumajang. **In the second quarter of 2021, during Ramadan, FOI together with Kraft Heinz Indonesia helped more than one hundred thousand families affected by disasters (floods, earthquakes, volcanic lava eruptions, hurricanes, landslides) through distributing 110,000 packages of food in 15 cities/districts on the island of Java.** This food assistance is expected to ease the burden on the community after the disaster that befell them and hopes that they enjoy the month of Ramadan with great warmth and welcome Eid Al-Fitr with joy.

Igniting the Hope for Underprivileged Children

Covid-19 pandemic and some disaster occurred in several areas in Indonesia made disruption of food access, especially for the lowest society. Even before the pandemic, many children in Indonesia still suffer from hunger. Based on a survey conducted by the Foodbank of Indonesia (FOI), around 40-50% in several densely populated areas, preschool children went to school on an empty stomach (not having breakfast).

MENTARI BANGSAKU Program, an initiative by Foodbank of Indonesia, has successfully delivered free food as additional food to children at underprivileged preschool and Elementary School. Early childhood education or preschool's student become our main beneficiaries because of their important role in the overall development of the child (from birth to 6 years old), which will assure them a good start in life.

MENTARI BANGSAKU program is driven by women in the Gerakan Seribu Ibu (en. One Thousands Mothers Movement) which invites mothers, teachers, and women to participate in overcoming hunger in children and opening wide access to food for all groups, igniting their hope to live, grow, develop optimally and achieve their dreams.

In October - December 2021, Foodbank of Indonesia together with Frisian Flag Indonesia distributed 100,000 milk boxes to elementary school children in 17 regencies/cities of Indonesia, covering the Islands of Sumatra, Java, Sulawesi, and Nusa Tenggara. It brings happiness and igniting hope to Indonesian children on the occasion of World Food Day and of course to provide access to healthier food for Indonesian children.

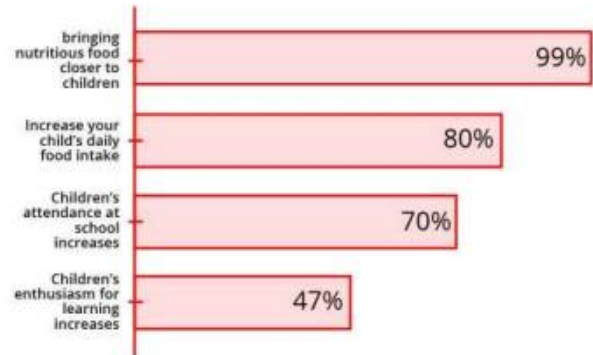

SAYAP DARI IBU

Protecting Their Future Dreams

The first 1000 days of life between a woman's pregnancy and her child's second birthday, are the golden period of opportunity to create brighter, healthier futures. How well or how poorly mothers and children are nourished and cared for during this time has a profound impact on a child's ability to grow, learn and thrive. This is because the first 1,000 days are when a child's brain begins to grow and develop and when the foundations for their lifelong health are built.

Pandemic situations have resulted in a growing number of job losses and income reduction. Lower incomes and higher prices of some foods put food out of reach for many. Disruptions to food and health systems are causing rates of severe malnutrition to rise substantially.

Women and children in the first 1,000 days are especially vulnerable. Women traditionally often eat last and have the least choice, especially in times of crisis or when emergency strikes. Meanwhile, poor nutrition during the first 1,000 days harms a baby's growth and development, affecting her ability to do well in school and earn a good living in the future.

SAYAP DARI IBU (en. Mother's Wings) is a nutrition intervention program by giving additional food and parenting education for beneficiaries during the first 1000 days of life of children until under 5 years old.

Foodbank of Indonesia collaborates with POSYANDU (Integrated Healthcare Center) to empower mothers in "giving wings" to their children at their golden age and hoping that the children can fly high with their wings to reach dreams in the future.

In 2021, SAYAP DARI IBU program has been implemented in both urban and rural areas, In urban areas it covers DKI Jakarta and Tangerang, while in rural areas, it is carried out in Cipeundeuy Village, Subang, the program namely Harapan Anak Negeri in collaboration with PT. Papertech Indonesia and Cibatok Village, Bogor Regency in collaboration with PT. Darya Varia Laboratoria Tbk.

During the pandemic, food assistance is provided door-to-door or taken independently by beneficiaries at the posyandu. Education about food, nutrition, and parenting to posyandu cadres and parents is carried out virtually.

KEBUN PANGAN KOMUNITAS

Bringing Food Access Closer

In these pandemic situations, the demand for food donations is increasing, many people who are in a position to seek food relief.

Therefore, in 2021, FOI encourages the women's movement to produce their own local food through KEPAK (Kebun Pangan Komunitas en. Community Food Garden). This brings closer access to food.

This effort is carried out to realize community food security and build the spirit of mutual cooperation in the community in dealing with the pandemic crisis situation. FOI assists the women in the community to utilize the open space around them into gardens to produce food stuff. This can reduce some of the food they have to buy to cook.

KEPAK Gang Mawar RT 7 Kembangan Utara, is the first community garden that FOI has assisted. Various vegetables have been successfully cultivated such as pakcoy, kale, tomatoes, and chilies, as well as catfish farming. The fertilizer used is also compost made independently.

Almost every week vegetables can be harvested and some of the results are directly processed through the Dapur Pangan FOI which has been present since 2019 in RT 7, into ready-to-eat food for the elderly in need and quarantined citizens around.

QURBAN HINGGA PELOSOK

Spreading Blessings To Remote Families

Every year, Muslims around the world commemorate the willingness of Ibrahim to follow Allah's command to sacrifice his son in an Islamic festival called Eid al-Adha. At Eid al-Adha, many Muslims gather with their families and may purchase an animal (goat/cow/buffalo) to be symbolically sacrificed in an act known as Qurbani. They divide it amongst themselves or share it with poorer people in their local community. However, not everyone can celebrate this moment.

In urban areas, qurban meat is abundant, residents can store and eat qurban meat for days. Meanwhile, in rural areas, there are only 1-2 sacrificial animals and some are not there at all. Foodbank of Indonesia tries to bridge this gap by buying animals from local farmers and distributing fresh meat to remote villages through QURBAN HINGGA PELOSOK (QHP).

Through the QHP program, FOI wants to invite the community in remote villages to improve the nutrition of children through the fulfillment of animal protein, as well as spread blessing and enjoyment of qurban meat with families who rarely or have never enjoyed it. For them, meat is a special food that is difficult to reach. Meat as animal protein has more complete essential amino acids than vegetable protein, which plays an important role in the development and growth of children.

In 2021, FOI received 1 cow and 22 goats from donors. We then distributed them to more than 523 families in Jagaraksa Village, Lebak, Banten, and Kiarasari Village, Sukajaya, Bogor.

Educate, Enlighten, Empower

Women Against The Crisis

Bikin Dapur Ngebul

(en. Keeping The Kitchen Alive) Campaign

Related to food and fighting hunger efforts, Foodbank of Indonesia (FOI) in collaboration with the Ministry of Maritime Affairs and Fisheries (KKP) and the Faculty of Agricultural Technology UGM (FTP-UGM), supported by several businesses, has launched the "Make Kitchen Ngebul" campaign in October 2021.

This campaign is part of the Gerakan Seribu Ibu (en. A Thousand Mothers Movement) to invite all Indonesian families to revive the kitchen by using local food ingredients, one of which is fish. The habit of cooking in the kitchen is expected to create healthier eating habits, especially for children so as to prevent the phenomenon of stunting.

This activity was symbolically inaugurated by pounding the wooden mortar by a representative from KKP, namely the Marketing Director of KKP's Marine and Fishery Products, Machmud SP. M.Sc, Founder of Foodbank of Indonesia, M.Hendro Utomo and Soenan Hadi Purnomo, Deputy Chair of the Central Forikan.

It is hoped that this campaign will encourage families to return to managing their own food sources, feel more confident in their cooking skills at home, and improve the quality of their children's food and diet. This is done with the 5M strategy, namely collecting, concocting, and processing their own food, distributing and eating together to build closeness between children and parents.

This activity was attended by 20 media and 200 FOI and Forikan volunteers from 34 provinces virtually via Zoom and Youtube.



Rembuk Pangan Indonesia

Foodbank of Indonesia's commitment to alleviating hunger includes an effort in educating the public and families on the children's hunger issues and the importance of nutrition and local solutions, especially consuming local food. FOI also encourages women's capacity building in food and nutrition. Knowledge is power and educating the families and the public is one of several keys to ending hunger.

Building awareness and education realized through direct training in the field and through communication channels. Foodbank of Indonesia initiated a Podcast Series titled REMBUK PANGAN INDONESIA (en. Indonesian Food Conference).

During 2021, Foodbank of Indonesia held 4 series of Podcasts Rembuk Pangan Indonesia to provide

information on efforts to fight hunger and open access to food, especially by introducing local food and implementing food diversification for families.

In commemoration of Nutrition Day 2021, Rembuk Pangan Indonesia invites academics and activists in the food sector to discuss the topic "Budaya Dapur sebagai Tradisi Nusantara" (en. Kitchen Culture as an Archipelago Tradition) as a momentum to build awareness of the importance of returning to the family kitchen culture as an effort to open access to food for children.

This discussion resulted in recommendations that could be input or suggestions for the government / interested parties in an effort to improve nutrition in children through kitchen culture.



Collaboration: *Ingredient to Strive Together*

Foodbank of Indonesia works with governments, universities, institutions, and volunteers to strengthen social movements and build mutual collaboration to alleviate hunger and fight the crisis.

| Governments Spotlight

DKI Jakarta Government

In April 2021, Foodbank of Indonesia and the Provincial Government of DKI Jakarta signed a Cooperation Agreement (PKS) on a program to improve food security for vulnerable groups in DKI Jakarta as an effort to open access to food for target communities.

Foodbank of Indonesia has supported local food banks in 36 sub-districts in all cities of DKI Jakarta and provided food assistance to children, elderly, underprivileged families through FOI programs regularly. In addition, through various social projects with donors, FOI has distributed more than 41,500 basic food aid packages to the people of DKI Jakarta who have been affected by the pandemic and disaster throughout 2021.



Universities Spotlight

FTP UGM

On behalf of the Faculty of Agricultural Technology, Universitas Gadjah Mada (FTP UGM), we appreciate FOI's work in opening access to food for the community, especially vulnerable people, and are committed to food sovereignty. This is in line with the vision and mission of FTP UGM, as a center of excellence with international standards in the provision of education, research, and community service in the field of agro-industry.

Collaboration between FTP UGM and FOI has been ongoing since 2019 in various fields including campaigns and public education in the field of food, application of appropriate technology, assistance and empowerment of women, distribution of food for vulnerable communities, movement to increase consumption diversity and food safety, etc. The collaboration is manifested in various concrete programs such as the launch of "Ikan untuk Anak (IUAK)", "Gerakan Mereka Butuh Kita", "Bikin Dapur Ngebul" campaign, namely the movement to revive the kitchen at home and in the community to reduce hunger and stunting in Indonesian children; local food processing assistance, and the virtual "Rembuk Pangan Indonesia".

This collaboration is very useful and has proven to open public awareness of the importance of developing a just food system. Hopefully, the collaboration and synergy between FOI and FTP UGM can continue to be improved and bring progress, prosperity, and blessings to the community and nation.

Donors Spotlight

Tous Les Jours (TLJ)

With the pandemic affecting daily lives, children who grow up during this period faced the threat of becoming a lost generation. To support parents to fulfill their family, especially children's needs, Foodbank of Indonesia has collaborated with Tous Les Jours (TLJ) since 2020 through #FoodBankbyTLJ program.

TLJ is very concerned about fulfilling nutrition for the Indonesian people because this is part of its commitment to continue to contribute to society. Through the #FoodBankbyTLJ program, FOI and TLJ distribute bread every day to children from underprivileged families who are very economically affected by COVID-19 because their families work as informal workers or daily laborers such as honorary PAUD/TK/TPA teachers, online motorcycle taxis, scavengers, street vendors and others.

In 2021, more than 193,300 pieces of bread from 31 TLJ stores were distributed to beneficiaries in JABODETABEK, Bandung, and Surabaya.

We have been working with FOI since 2020 and it is an honor for us to be able to help open access to food to reduce hunger in Indonesia. Since the beginning of the collaboration in 2017, Papertech owner's main mission has been to help the Indonesian people. Now, watching FOI grow to reach a wider area and beneficiaries, we are proud to be a part of it. When the pandemic situation came, efforts to bring food access closer for the community encountered several challenges. Food distribution is limited, people's purchasing power is declining, so many families lose their breadwinners. But at that moment there was also a big movement from FOI which was a response to difficult conditions, including the Gerakan Mereka Butuh Kita; Gerakan 1000 Ibu which reached remote villages, 40 thousand children and 8000 volunteers, the majority of whom were women; and the beginning of the Kebun Pangan Komunitas (KEPAK), which started around the Papertech factory in Cipendeuy, Subang. The KEPAK program encourages people to be independent in providing their own food needs so that they have food security amid difficult situations. With this spirit of empowerment, we hope this collaboration can inspire and be an example for other companies or individuals to do the same so that Indonesia can become a strong nation with quality human resources.
