Foreword

2022 was a transition year from the COVID-19 situation to the new normal. Various issues arose in Indonesia as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, one of which is persistent poverty and hunger, which still require further action. On the other hand, Food Loss and Waste is becoming a more serious problem in Indonesia. Based on the Ministry of National Development Planning/National Development Planning Agency (Bappenas) from 2000-2019, Indonesia produced 23-48 million tons of food waste per year, which is sufficient to feed 61-125 million people or 29-47 percent of the Indonesian population. The biggest generation occurs in the consumption stage.

FOI set out to tackle these issues, focusing on alleviating hunger especially to the most vulnerable group by making foods more available and accessible. Through obtaining the food they need for an active and healthy life, and where social safety nets ensure that those who lack resources still get enough to eat.

During 2022, we were pleased to initiate the 1st Congress of Foodbank of Indonesia (FOI) Network with the theme 'Awakening of the Nation, Food and Women' which was held on May 25 2022, which coincided with National Awakening Day. This congress aimed to build many food bank networks throughout Indonesia and was attended by 43 food bank organizations in 43 cities/districts and 230 sub-district points in Indonesia. This cross-cutting initiative is backed by many stakeholders such as the government, private sector, media, academics, and communities focused on strengthening awareness and issues about food loss and waste initiatives to alleviate hunger.

Foodbank of Indonesia initiated food waste regulation in Indonesia by encouraging the publication of a national-level regulation (Food Bank Draft Bills) through the People's Consultative Assembly (MPR RI) and Governor of DKI Jakarta. Furthermore, FOI for the first time made contact with The National Food Agency (NFA) of Indonesia and created a blueprint for their early systems about food waste management, based on our good practices. FOI and NFA actively carried out campaigns, especially with the Deputy for Food Insecurity through #GerakanKewaspadaanPangan in campaigning for the handling of food loss and waste to both regional food security services and also food business actors. We also were trusted as a representative of food bank in the G20 Regional Technical Workshop on Food Loss and Waste (FLW) which was attended by representative participants from 9 ASEAN countries. It is such an honor for us to get this much trust from the government.

Academics, especially from Gadjah Mada University, University of Indonesia, IPB University, and others, had an important role, helping us coordinate the implementation of community programs and improve the quality of the program by utilizing the results of research that can be applied to the community. They spread the knowledge to the community especially related to food and nutrition based on their newest research through offline and online platforms. One of our best moments with academics was The Youth Food Rembug (Rembug Pangan Orang Muda) event which collaborated with the Student Executive Board of the Faculty of Social and Political Sciences, University of Indonesia (BEM FISIP UI). It was an initial forum to gather young people's initial perspectives on food issues and to increase their awareness of food waste and nutrition problems in Indonesia.

Collaborative efforts are sought out in both FOI and the business sector. The form of private partnerships are very varied, including giving their excess food product donation, fundraising which is related to resource mobilization, research collaborations, and corporate social responsibility projects. One of our campaigns was collaborating with Lippo Mall Kemang FOI. We invited customers and tenants to participate in donating excess food to raise awareness and prevent food waste. We couldn't realize our vision without the support and assistance from our donor partnerships.

I would like to extend my sincere appreciation and gratitude to the donors and volunteers on behalf of the Foodbank of Indonesia for their invaluable support and assistance throughout the year 2022. We are inspired by our volunteers' willingness to keep fighting to help those who are most in need amid the crisis that has inspired us all. FOI expresses sincere gratitude to the volunteers who willingly dedicate their time, effort, and care to assist FOI in carrying out activities in the field, thereby ensuring the smooth distribution of food to those in need. Also, my gratitude to the donors for their generosity in supporting FOI activities, which allows FOI to keep moving forward in providing a positive change to those around us in need.

In commemoration of National Awakening Day 2022, Foodbank of Indonesia (FOI) initiated the 1st Congress of the FOI Network with the theme 'Awakening of the Nation, Food and Women' which was held on May 25 2022. This event was attended by many stakeholders such as the government, business sector, academics, and volunteers of FOI. This congress also encouraged the formation of food banks in the regions to open access to food for the people, which consists of 43 food bank organizations in 43 cities/districts and 230 sub-district points in Indonesia.

FOI Network builds awareness about food loss and waste, the important value of the organizations, and women in awakening the nation through food and family education. This movement cannot be separated from the role of women at the grassroots. Since 2020, Foodbank of Indonesia (FOI) has been campaigning for the 1000 Action Movement which places women in a central position in building future generations by reviving the kitchen as a center of activities with the 5M activities: collecting, mixing, processing, serving and sharing.



Gotong Royong:

Partnership Beyond Borders

According to the 2021 Food Waste Index reported by the United Nations Environment Program (UNEP), Indonesia is the largest food waste producer in Southeast Asia. Total food waste in Indonesia reaches 20.93 million tonnes annually. Citing a study by the Ministry of National Development Planning (Bappenas), the numbers that emerged were no less surprising. Food waste wasted in Indonesia from 2000–2019 reached 23–48 million tonnes/year. All of this food waste can provide food for 61–125 million people (or 29–47% of Indonesia's population).

Throwing food away is wasting the resources needed to grow, produce, or package that food. Meanwhile, the human population continues to grow and the demand for food consumption increases. If the habit of wasting food is not stopped, more resources will be wasted. The high intensity of food waste has an impact on several sectors, such as the economy, society, and the environment. As a result of this food waste, Indonesia suffers losses of at least IDR 213 trillion to IDR 551 trillion per year, or the equivalent of 4–5 percent of Indonesia's Gross Domestic Product (GDP).

Food that ends up in landfills will decompose and produce methane gas (CH₄) which is 25 times more dangerous than carbon dioxide (CO₂), as a trigger for global warming. The increase in the earth's temperature triggers many changes in the atmosphere that have an impact on unpredictable weather and climate. Indonesia as an archipelagic country with a geographical and hydrological position located between two continents, two oceans, and also in the ring of fire, makes Indonesia more vulnerable to the impacts of climate change. This will also have an impact on the continuity of food production which will certainly affect our food security. We can conclude that our consumption behavior will affect the continuity of our food availability.

Ironically, with so much food waste, it does not mean that all Indonesian people have enough food. About 8.34 percent of Indonesia's population is still experiencing food shortages. Indonesia is ranked 65th out of 113 countries, which even ranks below other ASEAN countries based on Global Food Security Index (GFSI) data.

Foodbank has been operating since 2015 with the mission of overcoming food waste and at the same time fighting hunger. In 2022, the Foodbank of Indonesia (FOI) carried out a national movement to address food waste by increasing public awareness and stakeholders, encouraging the formation of regulations regarding food waste, and building a national food bank network.

2022, was a crucial moment for Foodbank of Indonesia to make a strong relationship with the Indonesian Government, National Food Agency (NFA). FOI and NFA first made contact to share good practices for properly handling food loss and waste with the Indonesia Business Council for Sustainable Development (IBCSD) which proposed the Mutual Cooperation Initiative to Overcome Food Loss and Waste (GRASP) 2030.

Various campaigns and education were carried out with collaborators to increase awareness. Hearings were held with the government at city, provincial, and national levels. FOI encourages the issuing of regulations that regulate the management of excess food and encourages the reduction of food waste. Food banks are an effective solution to the problem of food waste, so there is a need for other food banks at the regional level to jointly make efforts to overcome food waste. In this movement, the Foodbank of Indonesia is aware that it cannot work alone. Therefore, beyond its borders, FOI together with various parties from various regions, fields, and backgrounds from governments, academics, media, private sectors, and other NGOs have become partners in ending hunger by overcoming food waste. Zero Waste to End Hunger

Volunteers play an important role in the movement of FOI activities. These activities would not be feasible without the assistance and contributions of volunteers. There are many inspiring stories from our volunteers while they are assisting in the field, such as Pak Agus's story from FOI Bekasi. Pak Agus has been with FOI since 2016 and has already gained a lot of experience in the program, such as disaster relief in Cianjur and assisting with the distribution of 5,000 basic necessities to people in need during the COVID-19 pandemic. Pak Agus is also involved in children's programs such as the Mentari Bangsa program, which distributes milk and biscuits for the early childhood education program (PAUD) in the Bekasi area.

Pak Agus said that FOI activities have been truly beneficial to local communities in need. Such as the activity of distributing bread to elderly people and PAUD children from low-income families. In addition to providing additional food for children, the distribution of bread based products from Tous Les Jours affords these children the opportunity to eat these products that are otherwise quite expensive.

Pak Agus was thrilled that by becoming a FOI volunteer, he could help families in different areas, such as when he was a FOI volunteer in Cianjur for three months. Even though the activities there ended, the bonds of friendship remain to this day.

"I hope that FOI will progress further so that it can often help by providing food to people in need, and hopefully every FOI program will continue to be sustainable," said Pak Agus.

Feeding People, Giving Hope

Since 2018, FOI has received donations from one of the major retailers in Indonesia. Many donations come in the form of basic ingredients that can be processed into a variety of delicious foods. These contributions are still good quality but no longer meet retail standards to be displayed on shelves.

Such excess foods are not only found in retail but also, on a smaller scale, in households. Some people tend to overspend even though it is not proportional to the amount consumed. This causes the potential for food waste.

On the other hand, thousands of families are struggling to fulfill their needs. They must strive to ensure that every day they and their families can fill their stomachs.

DAPUR PANGAN FOI (DPF), a community-based pantry located amid the community, is mobilized by local volunteers to cook and provide ready-to-eat food for underprivileged communities such as children, elderly, and people in need of donated excess food.

This pantry aims to improve beneficiaries' nutrition with nutritious food and gives hope to the beneficiaries and shows that they are not alone in facing their difficulties. This program has built a sense of community and social connection.

FOI collaborates with various parties, one of which is Metro TV and Adaro Foundation in strengthening and continuing to revive community pantries.

Amount total of 10 DPF spread across five areas of DKI Jakarta received #PaketBantuanUntukNegeri in the framework of PT Adaro's 30th Anniversary and Metro TV's 22nd Anniversary which contains groceries for families of farmers, fishermen and small business actors. DPF also cooks 9,210 portions of food for children and the elderly.

Envision Communities to End Hunger

In 2021, FOI encouraged the women's movement to produce their own local food through KEPAK (Kebun Pangan Komunitas en. Community Food Garden). This brings the community closer access to food.

In 2022, this effort is continuing to empower the community to realize food security and build the spirit of mutual cooperation. FOI assists the women in the community to utilize the open space around them into gardens to produce food stuff. This can make the community produce food ingredients that will also be processed in the Dapur Pangan to serve children and elderly people around them.

KEPAK Gang Mawar RT 7 Kembangan Utara, the first community garden that FOI has assisted since 2021, has developed to the second phase, an independent community garden in 2022.

Grace in the meat sacrificed

Every year, Muslims around the world commemorate the sacrifice Ibrahim made upon his son to follow God's command in Islamic Festival, Eid al-Adha. On this day, many Muslims gather with their families and may purchase an animal (goat/cow/buffalo) to be symbolically sacrificed in an act known as Qurbani. They divide it amongst themselves or share it with poorer people in their local community. However, not everyone can celebrate this moment.

In some areas, in one community many people can purchase qurbani so that the meat distributed is abundant. However, in other areas, especially remote areas, in one community maybe no one is able to offer qurbani, so no meat is shared and enjoyed together during the Eid al-Adha.

Foodbank of Indonesia tries to bridge this gap by buying animals from local farmers and distributing fresh meat to remote villages through QURBAN HINGGA PELOSOK (QHP). Through the QHP program, FOI wants to invite the community in remote villages to improve the nutrition of children through the fulfillment of animal protein, as well as spread blessing and enjoyment of qurbani meat with families who rarely or have never enjoyed it. For them, meat is a special food that is difficult to purchase. Meat as animal protein has more complete essential amino acids than vegetable protein, which plays an important role in the development and growth of children.

In 2022, FOI received 2 cows and 26 goats from donors. We then distributed them to more than 657 families in Kiarasari Village, Sukajaya, Bantar Karet Village, Nanggung Bogor Lebak, and Sempur Timur North Jakarta.

Ignite Hope for Our Sunshine

Many children in Indonesia still suffer from hunger. Based on a survey conducted by FOI, around 40-50% in several densely populated areas, preschool children went to school on an empty stomach (not having breakfast).

MENTARI BANGSAKU Program, an initiative by Foodbank of Indonesia, has successfully delivered free food as additional food to children at underprivileged preschools and elementary schools.

Early childhood education's student become our main beneficiaries because food plays important roles in the overall development of the child (from birth to 6 years old), which will assure them a good start in life and become Mentari Bangsaku (the sun of the nation) in the future.

Since 2021 until now, the Foodbank of Indonesia together with Tous les Jours. In 2022 have distributed 478.149 loaves of bread to early-childhood education students in 17 regencies/cities of Indonesia. It brings happiness, igniting hope and of course provides access to healthier food for Indonesian children.

Giving Hope to Their Future



Education and Training for Mothers of The Children in Pacarejo Village

Women and children in the first 1000 days of life are vulnerable. Whereas, the first 1000 days of life are the golden period for children's growth and developments. How well or how poorly mothers and children are nourished and cared for during this time has a profound impact on a child's ability to grow, learn and thrive.

Women traditionally often eat last and have the least choice of food, especially when they come from underprivileged families. Meanwhile, poor nutrition during the first 1000 days threatens a baby's growth and development, affecting her ability to do well in school and earn a good living in the future.

SAYAP DARI IBU (en. Mother's Wings) is a nutrition intervention program by giving additional food and parenting education for beneficiaries during the first 1000 days of life of children until under 5 years old. Foodbank of Indonesia collaborates with POSYANDU (Integrated Healthcare Center) to empower mothers in "giving wings" to their children at their golden age and hoping that the children can fly high with their wings to reach dreams in the future.

One of the program models which is implemented is Kampung Anak Sejahtera (KAS), a program which collaborated with Indonesia Ministry of Women Empowerment and Child Protection, did a nutrition model to give best practices in increasing the role of family in fulfilling children's welfare rights.



This program has been implemented in two regions (Gunung Kidul and Temanggung). There are many benefits from this program, such as positive changes in eating behavior, increasing nutritional status and awareness about food and nutrition.

Response on Emergency and Disaster

Lighten Their Difficulties with Happiness



An earthquake with a magnitude of 5.6 hit Cianjur, West Java on Monday, 21 November 2022 at 13.21 WIB, followed by aftershocks. The shock was even felt as far as Jakarta. Many elderly and children were crushed by collapsed buildings, injured, and left homeless.

The RED Team (Response on Emergency and Disaster) is moving to open a Food Kitchen to meet the needs of refugees in one of the isolated villages, Kampung Tanjakan Padaluyu, Cugenang, Cianjur.

For 3 months the Child Friendly FOI Food Kitchen Program continues. We invite all parties, good people who want to be a part so that we can continue to continue the joy for the children of the Cianjur earthquake survivors.

In presenting Dapur Pangan Ramah Anak, FOI collaborated with various parties.

The World Bank invites its employees to raise funds to buy food ingredients needed in the kitchen to be processed by volunteers and residents.

Apexindo provided support in the form of tools for household needs that were used by the survivors to survive in tents as many (how many) pillows et al.

DAAI TV as a media company under the Buddhist Tzu Chi Foundation also took part in donating food, stationery for children, as well as worship tools for residents to welcome the month of Ramadan.

With the collaboration of various parties, FOI can help totally 494 refugees, with details 150 children and 50 elderly and breastfeeding mothers, also 294 affected community people.

Furthermore, we also did many fun activities along RED efforts such as storytelling, drawing, and singing together with refugees to amuse them from their trauma effect.



Empty Your Plate:

Educate, Enlighten, and Empower

An action begins with awareness. One of the efforts that FOI is making to support the prevention of food waste is to increase the awareness of all parties from various backgrounds involved in our food system regarding this issue. Through education and enlightenment, the hope is to empower them to take real action.

Earth Day Commemoration

Foodbank of Indonesia together with partners held the 2022 World Earth Day Commemoration activity on 25th April which was attended by, among others, the Head of the DKI Jakarta Food Security, Maritime Affairs and Agriculture Service, Suharini Eliawati, Main Director of Perumda PD Pasar Jaya, Arief Nasrudin, representatives the private sectors, JNE & Superindo, Tebet Timur Market traders, FOI volunteers and the media.

The activity, which was held at the Tebet Timur Market, aims to build awareness and invite more parties to work together to reduce food waste, save the earth and end hunger. Symbolically, vegetable sellers and the business world handed over excess food to FOI which was received by FOI founder, M Hendro Utomo. This handover marks the commitment of all parties in preventing food waste which is used to reduce hunger in people in need.



#MakanTanpaSisa Campaign (en. #EmptyYourPlate)



Households experienced difficulties in meeting food needs that should have been needed during the Covid-19 pandemic. Based on the results of a survey by the LIPI Economic Research Center in July 2020, 87.3% of household enterprises and 64.8% of working households experienced financial difficulties during the pandemic. Foodbank of Indonesia together with Bank DBS Indonesia initiated the #MakanTanpaSisa Campaign, which is a campaign to combat food waste so that we can suppress the climate crisis and end hunger.

3,300 servings of ready-to-eat food distributed using the "Mobil Kulkas Berjalan", a food truck dedicated to educating and enlightening the public on the issue of food waste as well as empowering vulnerable communities with the help of nutritious food. This food truck educates the public to join our community movement #MakanTanpaSisa (empty your plate) and invites the wider community to "Sedekah Foto" by posting a "Mobil Kulkas Berjalan" photo on social media for the post is the same as donating IDR 10,000.

This campaign has had an impact on opening access to food for vulnerable groups by providing healthy and delicious food for and increasing awareness of the issue of food waste, as well as growing concern for sharing.

Congress I Foodbank of Indonesia Network

Taking place at the National Awakening Museum, the Indonesian Food Bank Network, which consists of Food Banks in 43 Cities/Regencies and 230 sub-districts, held its first hybrid Congress. The congress was attended by the Deputy Chairman of the Indonesian People's Consultative Assembly, Hidayat Nur Wahid, Director of Food & Agriculture Bappenas, Anang Noegroho, Professor of Food and Nutrition IPB, Prof. Dr. Ahmad Sulaeman, Psychology Lecturer at UIN Syarif Hidayatullah, Dr. Risatianti Kolopaking, M.Sc, founder of the Foodbank of Indonesia, M. Hendro Utomo, as well as representatives from the business world produced an agreement that an organized women's movement in the food sector is important for the rise of the Indonesian nation. This congress also encouraged the formation of food banks in the regions to open access to food for the people.



International Day of Awareness of Food Loss and Food Waste Commemoration



Foodbank of Indonesia together with the National Food Agency commemorates the International Day of Awareness of Food Loss and Food Waste with cross-sectoral stakeholders, namely government, academics, community organizations, and the business world with the theme Food and Nutrition Awareness Movement through Awareness of Potential Food Waste in a hybrid way, attended by cross-sectoral participants from various regions throughout Indonesia. In this activity, the Chairperson of the National Food Agency gave awards to activists in efforts to combat food loss and food waste and compiled joint resolutions to overcome FLW.

The success of handling food waste is one of the key factors in anticipating potential food crises and alleviating vulnerable and food-insecure areas in Indonesia. However, the successful handling of food waste requires joint commitment and collaboration across sectors.

Rembug Pangan Orang Muda

Foodbank of Indonesia (FOI) together with the Student Executive Board of the Faculty of Social and Political Sciences, University of Indonesia (BEM FISIP UI) held a youth discussion forum entitled Youth Food Rembug located at the Juwono Sudarsono Auditorium, FISIP UI to commemorate World Food Day which falls on the 16th October 2022 and Youth Pledge Day on October 28 2022. The discussion themed Food Awakening, National Awakening was attended by 60 youth representatives from 17 organizations/institutions and presented food, history, culture and media figures.

Indonesia has a big potential for food and young generation to encourage Indonesia's revival. The current geopolitical competition emphasizes three things that are important to master, namely technology, energy and food. Young people must be pioneers so that Indonesia can achieve food sovereignty.

It is hoped that the Youth Food Forum will become an initial forum to gather young people's initial perspectives on food and after the discussion is over, they will have a new awareness and anxiety that the food problem is a problem that must be solved together.



Efforts to Encourage Regulation

In making efforts to prevent food waste, regulation is one of the important things. If we look at countries with good practices in preventing food waste, some of them already have regulations governing waste management, prohibiting supermarkets from wasting food and encouraging households to recycle food waste. As a country that was once listed as the second largest food waste waster in the world (The Economist, 2016), Indonesia must make moves that have a big impact in preventing and reducing this food waste. Since its inception, FOI has had this awareness and has tried to encourage various parties to form regulations at both the regional and national levels regarding Food Waste and Food Banks.

Collaboration:

Ingredient to Strive Together

Foodbank of Indonesia works with governments, universities, institutions, and volunteers to strengthen social movements and build mutual collaboration to alleviate hunger and fight the crisis.

Governments Highlight National Food Agency

In May 2022, the Foodbank of Indonesia for the first time made contact with NFA to share good practices for thoroughly handling food loss and waste with the Indonesia Business Council for Sustainable Development (IBCSD) which proposed the Mutual Cooperation Initiative to Overcome Food Loss and Waste (GRASP) 2030.

After that, FOI and NFA actively carried out campaigns, especially with the Deputy for Food Insecurity through #GerakanKewaspadaanPangan in campaigning for the handling of FLW to both regional food security services and also food business actors.

On 9th December 2023, NFA with 9 organization communities was signing cooperation agreement to handle food waste management in order to the food waste prevention's movement throughout Indonesia with more comprehensive and massive. NFA has been handled over operational food truck to Foodbank of Indonesia to help FOI's operational purposes like delivering food donation to the beneficiaries in other cities.

Delegation Visit of Regional Technical Workshop on Food Loss and Waste G20 Presidency in Foodbank of Indonesia Yogyakarta



Foodbank of Indonesia (FOI) Yogyakarta was one of the field trip destinations for participants of the G20 Regional Technical Workshop on Food Loss and Waste (FLW). This event was held by the Agricultural Research and Development Agency, Ministry of Agriculture in collaboration with the Thunen Institute as organizer of food loss and food waste issues in the G20 Presidency. This visit aimed to study potential food waste management practices that have been carried out by Foodbank of Indonesia as a representative food bank in Yogyakarta. Attended by representative participants from 9 ASEAN countries, the field trip was carried out with visits to food storage and sorting warehouses. After that, they visited to FOI beneficiary partners, namely TK Negeri 3 and Posyandu Sunthi to witness the distribution of food for toddlers, children and the elderly.

Donors Highlight

Hilton Garden Inn Jakarta Taman Palem

Hotel Hilton Garden Inn Jakarta Taman Palem has committed to distribute excess food to FOI to be donated to people in need. This program has been running since July 2022 in #TravelWithPurpose program. Excess food from the hotel is channeled through the Kembangan Utara FOI Food Kitchen, about 6 kilometers from the hotel.

The food donations were then recooked by the volunteers of the FOI Food Kitchen which were then distributed to the beneficiaries, namely, children, the elderly, and informal workers who needed them. This action is a joint action in an effort to fight hunger and reduce food waste. In 2022, more than 89 kg of food were distributed to 255 beneficiaries.



Lippo Mall Kemang

The collaboration between FOI and Lippo Mall Kemang is an important collaboration, because not much has been done and it has become a pilot program between food banks and shopping centers. FOI together with Lippo Mall Kemang invites customers and tenants to participate in donating excess food to raise awareness among the public and tenant managers regarding food waste through educational materials posted in the mall environment with the #BersamamuSelamatkanPangan campaign.



University Highlight

Faculty of Social and Political Science, Universitas Indonesia (FISIP UI)

The problem of food wastage is not only a technical problem of food availability but also a cultural problem. People's behavior in consuming food is formed from a value system that becomes a habit. So, according to Prof. Semiarto Aji Purwanto, Dean of FISIP, University of Indonesia, needs to include elements of value in food production and consumption. In this case, the collaboration of FOI and FISIP UI as a socio-cultural education institution in campaigning on the issue of food waste was initiated.



FOI collaborated with FISIP UI has held "Rembug Pangan Orang Muda" to commemorate Hari Sumpah Pemuda on 30th October 2022. Theme of the discussion about "Kebangkitan Pangan, Kebangkitan Bangsa". This event was attended by more than 60 representatives of youth and student organization leaders from various regions and study backgrounds.

Media

Foodbank of Indonesia's commitment to alleviating hunger and includes an effort in educating the public about the issues. Public awareness can raise issues and encourage movements from the community and decision makers. Apart from direct education and training, FOI also conducts education through various communication channels to reach more parties.

Foodbank of Indonesia was present at the KITA Forum 2022 event with the theme Collaboration Space for Sociopreneurs, Creators & Corporations about Food-Waste-Energy as a guest speaker who spoke on behalf of sociopreneurs working on the issue of food waste. Spreading awareness about this issue by becoming a content creator or participating in becoming a sociopreneur working on overcoming it.

Media has an important role to build awareness in the community. Kompas is a prominent national media company consistent in raising issues on food waste, people's access to food and local food. Foodbank of Indonesia's movement and its campaign related to food waste have been published several times and have succeeded in increasing public attention.

On 27th May 2022, Food Bank of Indonesia visited Kompas to make a strengthen future collaboration. We have discussed about food loss and waste issue in the center of the community.

One of the most popular issues from Kompas' post is about the illustration of food waste in Jakarta. Food waste in Jakarta would measure 14 times the height of Monas and reach higher than Mount Kelud (1,731 m above the sea). This succeeded in attracting the attention of many people about food waste issues in Indonesia.
